Methodology




Hello. Arapahoe County invites you to participate in an important survey regarding county services, projects, programs, and a potential ballot measure this November. Please make your voice heard by sharing your thoughts and opinions on these critical issues. Your answers will be anonymous and confidential, and the survey will take just X minutes to complete.

Magellan Strategies is pleased to present the results of an online survey of 2,875 registered voters in Arapahoe County, Colorado. The interviews were conducted from February 12th to February 21st, 2024.

The overall survey responses have a margin of error of +/- 1.82% at the 95% confidence interval. Population subgroups will have a higher margin of error than the overall sample.

The survey results are weighted to be representative the voter turnout demographics of a Presidential election cycle in Arapahoe County, Colorado.

Survey Objectives



- The primary objective of this survey was to measure voter support and opposition for a 0.25% sales tax increase or a de-Brucing ballot measure to create additional funding for essential county services.
- The survey educated respondents about the impact of a potential 10% across-the-board budget cut.
- The survey tested messages and information about the reasons why these ballot measure are being considered.
- The survey measures job approval ratings for county programs and services.









In your own words, please describe the top two or three issues or problems that you think Arapahoe County should be addressing the most.

The top five themes were:

Infrastructure and Road Maintenance

Many residents highlighted the poor condition of roads, potholes, and the need for better road maintenance. Improving road safety, sidewalk construction, and addressing traffic congestion were significant concerns.

Homelessness and Housing Affordability

There are concerns about the homeless population, the lack of affordable housing, and the need for resources to support those in need. Encampments, panhandling, and providing affordable housing solutions were frequently mentioned.

Crime and Public Safety

Residents highlighted various crime-related issues, including property crime, theft, gun violence, and the need for more police presence and enforcement.

Taxation and Budget Management

There are concerns about high property taxes and calls for reducing taxes or cutting unnecessary spending. Respondents also mentioned the need for responsible budget management and allocating funds to essential services.

Community Services and Social Support

Residents emphasized the importance of providing social services, mental health resources, and support for vulnerable populations. There were calls for improved access to healthcare, education and assistance for families in need.











Do you think Arapahoe County has the financial resources to provide an acceptable level of county services, projects, and programs to county residents?






How would you rate the condition of the major streets and roads in Arapahoe County?

Do you consider them to be excellent, good, fair, or poor?




Do you approve or disapprove of the job the Arapahoe County Public Works Department is doing maintaining the county's streets and roads?




Do you think Arapahoe County has the financial resources needed to adequately maintain, repair, and improve the county's streets and roads?




Do you approve or disapprove of the job the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office is doing addressing county public safety needs and providing services?

last couple of years?




Do you think crime in your neighborhood has increased, stayed about the same, or decreased in the last couple of years?







Awareness of Arapahoe County TABOR Refund Methods




As you may be aware, due to the TABOR Amendment, many local governments return tax revenue that exceeds the established revenue limit to residents on an annual basis.

Before we continue, it is important to understand that Arapahoe County has not decided whether to put a ballot measure before voters this November to create additional funding sources for county services, projects, and programs.

In fact, your participation in this survey and sharing your honest opinions will help the county make that decision.

Even with decades of responsible budget management, Arapahoe County will have to consider budget decisions that will likely reduce or eliminate some county services, projects, and programs starting in 2025.

One way to avoid these budget reductions is to place a ballot question before voters this November.







Opinion of 10% Department Budget Reductions




Unfortunately, without additional revenue in the future, Arapahoe County will likely be facing at least a 10% reduction in its budget.



Opinion of 10% Budget Reductions







Top Reasons Voters Support 0.25% Sales Tax Increase

The top three themes were:

Need for Funding Essential Services/Quality of Life

Many respondents expressed the need for additional funds to support critical county services such as road maintenance, law enforcement, infrastructure improvements, public safety, and social programs. They see the sales tax increase as a means to support essential services, address community needs, and maintain a high standard of living.

Spread the Burden Equally

There is a sentiment that a sales tax increase spreads the financial burden more evenly across residents and non-residents who use county services, rather than solely relying on property taxes, which can disproportionately affect homeowners.

Minimal Financial Impact

Many respondents noted that the proposed .25% sales tax increase would have a minimal financial impact on individuals or households, especially when compared to the benefits it would provide to the community.

"Taxes are too high. Streamline government operations instead of spending more money. Reduce overhead." – Female, 65+, Unaffiliated, Homeowner, District 1

"Taxes are high enough. More effort should be made in funding needs through state and federal grants." – Male, 45-54, Unaffiliated, Homeowner, District 3

"There is enough money available now if you eliminate social programs and stick to what government is supposed to be." – Male, 65+, Unaffiliated, Homeowner, District 1

"Zero tax increases! You bring in enough revenue. Cut spending!!" – Male, 45-54, Republican, Renter, District 3

"Services have gone down while my taxes have skyrocketed. I am not receiving value for my tax dollar and would rather keep my money. Lower property taxes." – Male, 35-44, Other Party, Homeowner, District 5

"A blanket sales tax will negatively impact people who are already struggling." – Female, 18-34, Unaffiliated, Homeowner, District 2

"We pay enough. Clearly there is some mismanagement of funds happening in this county and the tax payer cannot continue footing the bill." — Female, 55-64, Republican, Homeowner, District 4

Top Reasons Voters Oppose 0.25% Sales Tax Increase

The top three themes were:

Government Inefficiency and Waste

Many respondents expressed frustration with the perceived inefficiency and wasteful spending of government funds, suggesting that the county should focus on managing its current budget more effectively before asking for additional revenue.

Financial Burden

Many respondents feel overwhelmed by existing high costs of living, such as food, gas, and electricity, and are already struggling to make ends meet. They believe that increasing taxes would further burden those who are already financially stretched. They express frustration with the high level of taxation across various aspects of their lives, including property taxes, income taxes, sales taxes, and vehicle registration fees.

Prioritization of Essential Services

There is a sentiment among respondents that the government should prioritize essential services and eliminate unnecessary or "feel-good" programs. They advocate for focusing on core services like public safety, infrastructure, and law enforcement.



Top Reasons Voters Support De-Brucing Ballot Measure

The top four themes were:

Need to Maintain/Improve Essential Services

Many respondents expressed a need for funding to maintain or improve essential county services, such as public works projects, law enforcement, homelessness reduction, and community programs. They believe that the county needs the money to provide these services effectively.

Community/Quality of Life

There was a strong sentiment among respondents that funding these programs and services would make Arapahoe County a better place to live, highlighting the desire to invest in the community's well-being and quality of life.

Financial Impact/Not Viewed as Tax Increase

Many respondents expressed a preference for retaining TABOR revenue or avoiding tax increases, suggesting that they would approve the ballot measure as a means to fund necessary initiatives without imposing additional financial burdens on taxpayers.

Top Reasons Voters Oppose De-Brucing Ballot Measure

The top three themes were:

Opposition to Tax Increases

Many respondents express strong opposition to any further increase in taxes, stating that they are already burdened by high property taxes and cannot afford additional taxes.

Fiscal Responsibility/Inefficient Government Spending

There is a widespread sentiment that the government does not spend taxpayer money wisely and efficiently. Many believe that there is already enough revenue available and that the government should focus on better managing its existing funds rather than asking for more.


Support for TABOR



How do you currently receive news and information about what's happening locally in your community? Select all that apply.






Thinking now about the people in your community who you trust for information on important local issues. Who among the following do you trust? Select all that apply.





